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INTRO

- COVID-19 presents a unique opportunity to evaluate strengths & opportunities to improve an organization's safety culture
- The U.S. freight rail industry has continued to operate throughout the pandemic
- Given the importance of safety & safety culture in this industry, it is fruitful to examine how railroads are responding to the pandemic & how employees are perceiving this response


METHOD

- Participants: Utilized archival survey data from one large U.S. freight railroad collected in mid-late 2020; analyzed data from 196 participants who provided 358 open-ended comments about their railroad's COVID-19 response
- Measures: safety climate perceptions (78 survey items*);
 perceptions of the railroad's COVID-19 response (one survey item & an open-ended comment section); all survey items
 scored using a 5pt agreement scale
- Data preparation: Coded open-ended comments into themes/categories & assigned each a valence
 (1 = negative, 2 = neutral, 3 = positive)
- Analyses: Bivariate analyses & regression examined the relationship between perceptions of safety climate & the railroad's COVID-19 response

Railroad employees generally perceived opportunities for improvement in their railroad's safety culture & COVID-19 response.

More positive perceptions of **safety culture** predicted more positive perceptions of the railroad's **COVID-19 response**

These results bolster the Value of a strong safety culture!


